When I became adjutant general four years ago, I sought out ways to unleash the untapped potential of the Nevada Guard's personnel and resources. I am very proud of the Nevada Guard's new partnership with the Government of Samoa and know that the Nevada Guard is among the nation's leaders in expertise on relations with countries in Oceania based on our State Partnership Program experience.

We have just concluded the 82nd Nevada Legislative Session, celebrated the promotion of Brig. Gen. D. And, just last week, the Nevada National Guard continued its tradition of taking home Diversity, Equity and Inclusion awards at the national level when the 152nd Force Support Squadron garnered the National Guard Excellence in Diversity Award in the Air National Guard Unit category (see page 11 for letter from the Chief of the National Guard Bureau, Gen. Daniel Hokanson).

WATERS PROMOTED TO BRIGADIER GENERAL

NEVADA DIRECTOR OF JOINT STAFF RISING STA

RENO — D. Rodger "Dan" Waters, a Soldier whose career began as an enlisted helicopter mechanic in 1985 and included a steady climb through the officer ranks of the U.S. Army for three decades, attained the rank of brigadier general July 14 in a ceremony conducted at the Nevada Army Guard's Army Aviation Support Facility.

Waters, 55, of Sparks, enlisted in the Army at age 17 after graduating from high school in Tempe, Ariz., and he's worn an Army uniform ever since.

As one of two Nevada Army Guard generals responsible for 3,300 Soldiers statewide, Waters will continue to serve in his current position as Director of the Joint Staff, the position he assumed in February when a Colonel.

"I love Nevada, I love the military and I love the mission," Waters said.

Adjutant General Maj. Gen Ondra Berry praised Waters before promoting the renowned aviator. Waters' initial military branch was Aviation but his primary branch is now Infantry.

"We can't thank you and your family for all you have done," Berry said to Waters in front of several hundred attendees.

Berry recapped Waters' career in the Nevada Army Guard and he also mentioned Waters' foreign tours. Nevada's two Army Guard brigadier generals serve as advisers to Berry, who was appointed in September 2019. Brig. Gen. Troy Armstrong is the Nevada Army Guard's Land Component commander and Waters is the Director of the Joint Staff who oversees human resources, intelligence, joint operations, cyber security, the counter drug task force, emergency management and the 92nd Civil Support Team.

Berry, along with Waters' wife Kimberly and two of their adult children, assisted the state's newest general with replacing his rank. The general's one-star flag was also presented to him.

NEVADA COMPLETES AIR DEFENDER IN GERMANY



EXERCISE LARGEST IN NATO HISTORY

GERMANY – The 152nd Airlift Wing partnered with nine other Air National Guard C-130 wings, the German Air Force, Romanian Air Force among other allied and partner nations at Wunstorf Air Base, Germany to provide combat tactical airlift for NATO's largest ever air redeployment exercise: AIR DEFENDER 2023 from June 12-23, 2023.

The exercise saw 25 countries, 250 aircraft and over 10, 000 participants engage in two weeks of sustained air operations. Led by the German Air Force, AD 23 offered another opportunity for partner nations who value freedom and democracy to exercise collective defense, demonstrated the unified resolve of NATO to fight and win an air war over the continent of Europe, according to NATO.

For two weeks, German civil airspace was partially closed to make way for the exercise's 1,700 sorties of air combat and air mobility operations.

"AIR DEFENDER 23 was one of, if not the most meaningful experiences of my 16 years of military service," said Lt. Col. Matthew Schwegel, assistant director of operations at Wunstorf Air Base and assigned to the 152nd Airlift Wing, Nevada Air National Guard in Reno, Nev. "To execute daily formation inter-flies with our NATO allies, and to fully integrate into a German air base proved the unity and interoperability of our NATO and partner-nation alliances. Our German allies were the most gracious of hosts and the most professional of aviators that I've ever had the privilege of working with."

Two crews and one C-130H3 tail from the 152nd AW participated in multiple force-on-force, joint multinational airdrop and international sustainment missions across the continent of Europe. Air National Guard C-130s were instrumental to the deployment, sustainment and redeployment of U.S. Combat Air Forces throughout the exercise: Delivering over 1.3 million pounds of cargo and 1,800 passengers to Combat Air Force spoke locations. Supporting this effort were a contingent of 152nd maintainers, air crew tactics planners, medics and air crew flight equipment technicians, all of whom seamlessly integrated into the expeditionary airlift group at Wunstorf.

"If there's one takeaway I have from the experience, it's that despite our different cultures, we really have more in common with our NATO partners and allies than I ever realized," Schwegel said. "We're cut of the same cloth and share the same societal and military-professional values."

CHIEF: DEM ENSURES COOPERATIVE APPROACH TO RESILIENCE

CARSON CITY – The Nevada Division of Emergency
Management and Homeland Security is the civil authority agency
that the Nevada National Guard supports in time of need. In 2021,
oversight of the Division was relocated from the Nevada
Department of Public Safety to the Office of the Military. This
allows a synergy between Guard domestic operations and
local/state civil authority needs. The Chief of the Division reports
directly to the adjutant general and works closely with the Director
of the Joint Staff to ensure a cooperative, collaborative approach to
improving Nevada's resilience.

DEM/HS works to protect, prevent, respond, mitigate, and recover from any incident. This is done through a locally executed, state-guided, and federally-supported goal. Towns, special districts, cities, and counties are the front line to protect Nevadans and our visitors from harm, from normal day-to-day activities of law enforcement, fire/EMS, and public health, or the larger issues such as flooding, earthquakes, pandemic, and wildland fire. The Division works to build relationships so everyone has what they

As a Nevada National Guardsman, you know the diversity of Nevada: preparedness efforts of Dyer are much different than Las Vegas. This is what keeps DEM/HS busy! A small staff of 40 employees work to help our communities improve their preparedness and response. We help with plan writing, liaison officers, funding for recovery efforts, the Civil Support Team, or work with the Governor and Legislature to deploy quick reaction forces and medical teams for special events.

DEM/HS has two offices: one within the Carson OTAG complex where the JOC is co-located along with the Nevada Threat Analysis Center. The second one is within the Las Vegas Readiness Center which is shared with the Nevada Office of Cyber Defense and Coordination. While these may be the physical locations, you are very likely to find our staff in the field, either at a local emergency planning committee meetings, conducting training and exercises for our partners, or at the scene of an incident or special event. This is where DEM/HS excels: reaching Nevadans where they are to provide assistance.

As a guard member, you are part of our system, our plan to help our local partners. That means your family must be ready for your immediate departure to help those in need, be at high-clearance vehicles during a flood, staffing roadblocks, securing critical infrastructure, fighting a wildland fire, or other tasks for which the Guard is the best fit. Each family needs a 72-hour disaster supply kit so they can weather the storm. Visit dem.nv.gov to learn more about what goes into your personal preparedness kit. HENDERSON – Located in the charming southeast corner here at the Henderson Armory stands a beacon of hope for Nevada's future generations - the pride of the Nevada National Guard, STARBASE Henderson. The program caters to the curious minds of our fifth-grade students, and fuels their love for science through engaging, hands-on activities.

STARBASE Henderson provides a nurturing environment where young minds can unlock their full potential in STEM subjects (Science, Technology, Engineering, Mathematics). The curriculum is crafted to bridge the gap between theoretical learning and practical application, bolstering students' readiness for the challenges of higher education and the professional world. Our interactive lessons in coding, robotics, mathematics, engineering design, and science directly supports the Nevada Academic Content Standards, preparing our students for their forthcoming academic journey.

A key facet of our STARBASE Henderson STEM program involves introducing our students to an array of potential STEM careers. We believe it's crucial to present these possibilities early in their educational journey, thus paving the way for informed academic choices in middle and high school that lead to fulfilling professional lives.

In the past year alone, STARBASE Henderson has served as an academic home to over 900 students across the Las Vegas Valley, offering them exciting activities that cultivate a profound appreciation for science and mathematics. Due to overwhelming demand, a waiting list of over 20 schools emerged, reflecting our program's growing popularity and influence.

To our delight, the Department of Defense, recognizing the value of our work, approved an expansion program in May. This enables us to double our reach and serve twice as many students in the forthcoming school year, providing them with hands-on STEM projects that stimulate a passion for learning.

A highlight of our STARBASE Henderson program is the engaging 'Eggbert' project. Our students step into the shoes of engineers, utilizing their critical thinking, problem-solving, mathematical, and communication skills to design, construct, and refine a safe vehicle for Eggbert, our astronaut. Faced with real-world challenges such as budget restrictions and limited materials, they collaborate in teams to develop, test, improve, and proudly present their creations. This memorable project immerses students in the engineering design process, enhancing their readiness for future STEM pursuits.



In May, STARBASE Henderson proudly hosted its inaugural event, 'Lunch, Learn and Play like a Fifth Grader'. We welcomed esteemed stakeholders from the military, local community, and the Clark County School District for a riveting half-day of interactive learning experiences. It was truly heartening to witness these adults wholeheartedly participate in our science experiments, expressing amazement at the advanced level of technology we make accessible to our students.

Furthermore, STARBASE Henderson is diligently collaborating with the Clark County School District. Our shared goal is to ensure that our activities not only complement the District's newly adopted science curriculum, Amplify, but are also meticulously aligned with the Nevada Academic Content Standards. This concerted effort guarantees our program is consistently tailored to the evolving needs of our students, further preparing them for the future.

We are enthusiastically preparing for yet another extraordinary year, ready to ignite sparks of curiosity and invest in the bright futures of the next generation of Nevada's innovators and leaders!

NEVADA GUARD ENTERS NEW SPP AGREEMENT

SAMOA PARTNERS WITH NEVADA GUARD

SAMOA – The Nevada National Guard, the U.S. Embassy in Samoa and Government of Samoa officials are ecstatic to announce the official collaboration between the Nevada National Guard and the Government of Samoa under the auspice of the National Guard's State Partnership Program was signed and finalized on July 6. The collaboration promises to fortify the bonds between Samoa and the United States and represents a significant milestone in diplomacy and cooperation between the two nations. Coincidently this month, the National Guard's State Partnership Program is marking 30 years of mutually beneficial missions, exchanges and exercises in every corner of the globe since the program's inception in 1993.

The State Partnership Program is a Department of Defense program that pairs National Guard states with foreign countries. The program aims to facilitate mutual support, cooperation, and development across various sectors, including defense, emergency management, and humanitarian assistance. The Government of Samoa is the Nevada Guard's third partner; it has also teamed with the Kingdom of Tonga since 2014 and the Republic of Fiji since 2018. According to the National Guard Bureau, there are now 100 security cooperation agreements between the National Guard states, territories and the District of Columbia and countries around the world: The total reflects that more than half of the world's 195 sovereign recognized nations are participating in the State Partnership Program.

Samoa is composed of numerous islands in the South Pacific Ocean and lies about halfway between Hawaii and New Zealand. The county has a population of about 207,000 and about 75 percent live on the island of Upolu. Its total land mass is just slightly smaller than Rhode Island at 2,831 square kilometers.

From Economic Hardship Form

The Patriot Relief Account is no longer exclusively for members currently deployed. The economic hardship factor now applies to all members thanks to a recent decision from Nevada National Guard leadership and the state administration office.

In 2005, the Nevada State Legislature enacted law to help Guardsmen with reimbursement of textbooks, reimbursement of Servicemember's Group Life Insurance premiums and monetary relief from economic hardship (up to \$5,000). To prove economic hardship, members must submit the application form either to their unit education officer or directly to the state administration office at 775-884-8467.

The 82nd Nevada Legislative Session concluded in June 2023. The biennial session brings Nevada lawmakers to Carson City for four months every other year. This year, Nevada lawmakers thanked members of the Nevada National Guard with the above laws and capital improvement projects. In total, these funds include \$56 million for the Nevada National Guard, primarily with money from the state general fund, with about 68 percent of funds going to much-needed renovations and facility upgrades. Additional funds will support 20 new positions in the Nevada Office of the Military, including five positions in the State Admin office and \$1 million in one shot state funds for facility projects, said

Additionally, he was able to assist in a couple promotions. 2LT Dhabi Lewis was promoted to 1LT Chaplain and SSG Damien Jorgensen was promoted to SFC. MAJ Troy Dandrea, SFC Damien Jorgensen, and SGT Coleman Monahan were awarded an Army Achievement medal for their excellent work in preparing. coordinating, and executing this training. SSgt Janica Buri was coined by BG Armstrong for going above and beyond in her assistance with the preparation and execution of the training. The theme of the training was Unity, throughout the workshop there were sections that helped each person examine their own skills and identify their personality traits, mixed in with opportunities to work with their team and combine their skills to develop a new ministry project to serve the men and women of the Nevada National Guard. Each ministry project that was developed was exciting and fresh and combined their skills, gifts and character traits for maximum potential of success. The Chaplain Corps had guest speakers that helped them grow in their counseling and listening skills.

They were treated with key note speaker retired (MSG) Stan Harvey who inspired them to pursue excellence in all they do and to allow the calling that has been placed on their lives be multiplied as they serve the men and women of the Nevada National Guard.
